- We use the present simple:
 - to talk about something that is always or usually true:

 I live here. Children ask a lot of questions.
 - to talk about things that happen regularly:
 She often phones me. They play football every day.
- We often use adverbs of frequency (e.g. always, usually, often, sometimes, never) and other time expressions (e.g. every day, in the morning) with the present simple. The adverbs come before the verb. Every day, in the morning, etc. come at the beginning or end of the sentence:

She often phones me. They play football every day.

In affirmative sentences, we add -s or -es in the third person singular (he, she, it): I live \rightarrow he lives we watch \rightarrow she watches they fly \rightarrow it flies

Affirmative I/you/we/they live he/she/it lives
